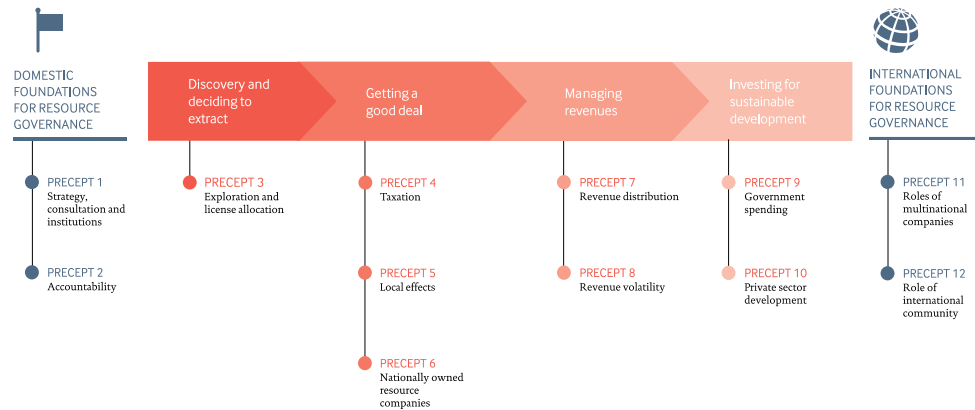
THE SUMMER SCHOOL

The Africa Regional Extractive Industries Knowledge (REIK) Hub was established by the Natural Resource Governance Institute (NRGI) in collaboration with German International Development Cooperation (GIZ) in 2009. The summer school which is one of the Hub's core activities is open to senior level civil society activists who have been engaged in the Extractive sector, Members of Parliament serving in Extractive Industry (**EI**) relevant parliamentary sub-committees and senior level journalists/editors that cover **EI** relevant topics.

The 2-week residential course comprehensively covers fundamental and intermediate governance issues in the **EI decision chain** based on the NRGI decision chain.

The course is designed using the NRGI decision chain framework to deepen knowledge and equip participants with skills for them to undertake independent analysis of national strategies, policies, fiscal and revenue management policies, International and regional transparency initiatives such as EITI reports analysis, contracts analysis and finally understanding of key legislation in their own countries. Based on sound independent analysis of these legal frameworks; accountability actors can develop informed strategies to engage in the management of the sector.

The decision chain



Over the last seven years over 240 participants have come from Britain, Ghana, Kenya, Iraq, Liberia, Malawi, Mauritania, Mozambique, Nigeria, Sierra Leone, South Africa, South Sudan, Switzerland, Tanzania, Zambia, Mozambique and Zimbabwe to be trained during the summer school. In 2017 there are 45 participants from Botswana, Cameroun, Ghana, Kenya, Mozambique, Nigeria, Sierra Leone, South Africa, Tanzania, Uganda, Malawi, Zimbabwe. Resource persons are seasoned experts from across the continent and beyond who have both academic and industry backgrounds.

Field trip

An integral aspect of the summer school is a field trip to mining sites where participants interact with chiefs and community people in the mining area. This is a particularly useful exercise as besides the affected community, participants have ample interaction with the International extractive company in a class room setting where technical staff take turns to make presentations ranging from mine geology, reserves of the mine, extraction methods, the company's environmental stewardship and their community development programs.

Finally, participants interact with local government officials to understand some of the administrative challenges faced by mining districts and how revenues from the industry are used to address their peculiar issues. The field trip allows participants to grasp issues from all stakeholders and upon returning to campus undertake autonomous analysis on where problems lie, and identify legal, fiscal and administrative solutions using tools gained during the summer school.

For those participants from national NGOs, the field trip offers new opportunities for potential areas of engagement; identifying issues that can be addressed at national level to relieve sub-national challenges. Members and Clerks of Parliament also develop plans to raise issues with their peers in Parliament, and media write stories that put the spot light on the issues uncovered. Local government officials attending the summer school have the opportunity to learn from the pitfalls experienced and determine to avoid them in their own districts.

Practical Policy Labs

The summer school places strong emphasis on the transfer of practical analytical skills. Each body of knowledge (module) provides participants the opportunity to analyze real life contracts, legislation, fiscal policies etc; and allow for comparisons between countries to draw out best practice.

Course Structure

The summer school is made up of modules that cover the EI value chain. Each chain is structured to include:

- i. General Concepts (theory and practice)
- ii. Comparative analysis of current situations (from the region and beyond)
- iii. Case studies from the region
- iv. Policy labs to analyze regional case studies
- v. Plenary discussions and conclusions

As a result, participants have opportunities to share experiences and strategies with their counterparts from the region. Participants are duly awarded Certificates of Participation at the end of the training program.

Main Focus:

Oil, Gas and Mining activities along the value chain of the Extractive Industry.

Purpose:

The purpose of this year Summer school is to facilitate:

1. A deeper understanding of the issues and challenges in the Extractive Industry within the Africa region.
2. Use insights to improve upon the existing frameworks in the Sub-Region.
3. To develop regional capacity to provide effective training and mentoring to grow the number of knowledgeable, skilled human resources who are duly equipped to ensure strong oversight and governance of Extractive Industries (EI) and natural resources.

Approach:

The approach will be very interactive and will bring out in the open the knowledge already existing. A dialogue to identify and discuss very important issues will also be employed in the approach. Practical simulation exercises will be encouraged.
